The increase in information flows and the emergence of the knowledge-based society will enrich our lives, but, on the other hand, it may deepen the polarization between nations. It is my opinion that libraries will play a very significant and effective role in resolving this problem.

Korea has been making extraordinary strides in its effort for the qualitative and quantitative development of libraries. In the three most recent years, 3,800 school libraries and nine children's libraries were opened, and last June the National Library for Children and Young Adults was opened. Also, by 2011, Small Libraries, which act as community centers will be expanded to every local community nationwide.

Furthermore, we will continue our efforts to improve and advance the library system with such undertakings as the digitalization of library resources and by actively participating in international cooperative programs.

Distinguished guests,

A long time ago, in the 13th century, Korea made an important contribution to the advancement of civilization by inventing the metal type and printing press. And Korea is still one of the few nations trying to make dynamic progress in the area of utilizing information.

As a nation that has retained its cultural heritage and also built a state-of-the art information infrastructure, Korea, I believe, is the right place for you to meet and share views on the present and future of libraries.

I sincerely hope that this congress will provide valuable opportunities to share research information and practical experiences on libraries from many countries and so lead to increased cooperation between libraries throughout the world.

Once again, let me congratulate you on the opening of the World Library and Information Congress and I hope your stay here in Korea will be pleasant and productive.
