In 2006 the SC held a mid-year meeting in Paris and a preconference, open session, and meetings at the annual conference in Seoul. A major focus of discussion was to assess the value of the reference toolkit for librarians and others in developing countries. Hopefully during 2007 we will see some movement in this arena as well as opportunities to collaborate with other sections within IFLA. Much of this discussion will take place during the midyear meeting in New Jersey in March.

A Midwinter meeting was held in Paris on March 3, 2006. Library visits were held on March 4, 2006. The agenda included discussion of minutes from Oslo; Seoul programmes, planning of activities regarding approved Action Plan 2006-2007, VRD and IFLA, and other business, including updates on various initiatives.
